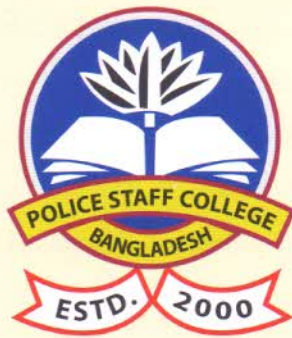

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Message

It gives me immense pleasure to welcome the readers of PSC newsletter to an exciting new year with new hope and aspirations. Here you will find some news on how differently and interestingly PSC is progressing towards its vision of changing Bangladesh Police through quality training and research.

Due to political unrest and the subsequent engagement of police officers to the public order management, PSC could not run its official core courses in the early 2015 except the SAARC training course. Despite that, this first quarter of 2015 is providing the time of substantial growth of PSC, with our partnership training programs, research activities, participants' enrolment, and staff excellence, all reaching a considerable height. PSC is successful in continuing its close collaboration with international training bodies such as US based Anti Terrorism Assistance program (ATA) and ICITAP; UNDP based PRP; and UNICEF etc. In terms of our training programs, PSC has successfully run its SAARC training course for the 3rd consecutive time, this year with a highest participation of SAARC member countries. Almost all SAARC countries excluding Pakistan attended the course. This has reflected a continuing trend of sustained growth with student enrolments in PSC international course showing more participation this year, by 37%, than that in the previous year. At the same time, PSC's one of the directing staff Mr. Zahid, Deputy Director (Admin), was awarded the prestigious President Police Medal (PPM) this year as a recognition of his exemplary and commendable contributions to Bangladesh Police. Furthermore, during this tenure, PSC received a high profile visit from the Department of policing, Intelligence and Counter-Terrorism, Macquarie University, Sydney, Australia; a significant visit by high officials from ATA, US Embassy Dhaka, all bringing the college with a new sight of progress. This edition of PSC Newsletter gives details of these new issues and developments which would lead to make 2015 a successful and dynamic year.

I am very much appreciative to the top leadership of PSC's Research, Planning and Evaluation Wing, Mr. Matiur. Without his apt direction, academic prudence and continual hardship; none of the newsletter issues could be brought out in such an interesting and lucid format. I would acknowledge the contributions of all those faculties and staff who extended their hands to bring out this issue. My sincere gratitude also lies to all members of the editorial board, publishers and other contributors who worked behind the scenes to make this effort successful.

3rd SAARC Course on 'Transnational Crime: SAARC Perspective': An International Course for the SAARC Police Officers in the Rank of SP

PSC is happy to successfully run its only international course named 'Transnational Crime: SAARC perspective' for the third consecutive year. It is a three week course conducted over the period from 22/02/2015 to 12/3/2015. A total of 20 participants in the rank of superintendent of Police attended the course of which 2 each from Afghanistan, Bhutan, India, Maldives and Sri Lanka, one from Nepal and 09 from the host country Bangladesh. In gender context, two were female participants and both of them were from the host country. 31 topics under 6 modules were taught over 3 weeks. It was a residential course where participants were provided with individual suit having world class facilities including the high speed internet connection.

Course Highlights

- First ever international course of PSC turned into the 3rd consecutive year with an aim of establishing a common security ground across the region through sharing and adopting the best practices of policing on some common transnational crimes like terrorism or human trafficking etc.
- As many as Seven (7) SAARC member countries excluding Pakistan attended the course.
- 20 participants in the rank of SP participated in the course
- 6 modules covered 31 topics over 15 working days
- 7 field trips of which the visits of Father of the Nation Mazar complex and Cox's Bazar strategic location took much interest.

Visits of ATA officials:

Focus on capacity building and curriculum development for PSC as well as more diversified training for Bangladesh Police.

PSC was delighted to receive a visit from the ATA officials from the US Embassy Dhaka on 26 February, 2015. The aims of this visit were priority identification for conducting training courses according to the need and request of Bangladesh Police, arranging joint seminar/workshop on contemporary police issues and mutual consultation in preparing the course curricula. The ATA group having five members was headed by, Special Agent, Overseas Criminal Investigations Unit, US Embassy, Dhaka- Mr. Mathew Kelley. Among the others, Assistant Legal Attaché, US Embassy Dhaka- Mr. Frank Heckendorn; and Program Coordinator, International Criminal Investigative Training Assistance Program (ICITAP) Ms. Katie Stowe were present.

The Rector, MDS (RP&E), MDS (Training) along with the other faculty members had a long discussion with the visiting ATA members. They had a fruitful discussion with the hope that ATA will provide more training programs according to Bangladesh needs, will help capacity building of PSC through offering frequent instructor development courses and training management course and will assist PSC to develop curricula in counter terrorism and intelligence related issues. The guests were entertained with light refreshments.

Joint conference between ICITAP and PSC

Regional counter terrorism conference at ICC: Joint Conference offered by PSC, ICITAP & OPDAT

‘The Rabat Good Practices Memorandum on the investigation and prosecution of terrorism cases, foreign fighters and UNSCR, 2178’.

- Focused on good practices in the investigation and prosecution of terrorism cases
- Bangladesh, India, Maldives, Nepal & Pakistan attended the conference
- A conglomeration between Police and Prosecutors across the region
- Experts from the US Department of Justice, OPDAT, ICITAP and FBI and other related agencies from USA shared their experiences and expertise regarding the issue.

Psc arranged a successful four days regional conference jointly with the Office of Overseas Prosecutorial Development, Assistance and Training (OPDAT) and International Criminal Investigative Training Assistance program (ICITAP) at its ICC hall from February 2 to 5, 2015. The conference focused on good practices in the investigation and prosecution of terrorism cases. It is the outcome of the Global Counterterrorism Forum Rabat Memorandum on Good Practices for effective counterterrorism practice.

The aim of this conference was to unite police and prosecutors from Nepal, Pakistan, India, the Maldives and Bangladesh with the experts from the United States Department of Justice, OPDAT, ICITAP, the FBI and other agencies to share expertise and experience on how best to investigate and prosecute terrorism cases. This conference not only focused on the fifteen distinct good practices set forth in the Rabat Memorandum but also stressed on police-prosecutor cooperation and regional cooperation.

The sessions encouraged nations to examine the effectiveness of their counter terrorism legislation. It studied the case studies of successful investigations and prosecutions. Each

delegation from the respective countries outlined the challenges and issues they faced in addressing terrorism and presented those before the audience. The presentations offered participants a greater understanding of counter terrorism strategies and specially insights about how effectively and efficiently deal with such sensitive terrorism cases.

A total of 39 participants across the region attended the course. From Bangladesh Police, 13 officials in the rank of Sub_inspector to Addl DIG, who are engaged in counter terrorism efforts such as from Police headquarters (PHQ), the Police Bureau of Investigation (PBI), the detective Branch (DB), the Criminal Investigation Department (CID), and Special Branch (SB), participated in that conference. The other officials from Bangladesh included four Metropolitan Magistrates, six prosecutors and six Bangladesh Bank officials. Besides, 4 delegates (of them 2 were Police and 2 were prosecutors) from each of the countries: Nepal, the Maldives and Pakistan attended the conference.

The inaugural ceremony was delightful by the gracious presence of the honorable IGP, Bangladesh Police Mr. AKM Shahidul Hoque bpm, ppm as the Chief Guest. US Embassy Dhaka's Deputy Chief of Mission Mr. David Meale, OPDAT's Regional Director Ms. Amy Chang Lee and ICITAP's Program Director Mr. William Koertje were also presented in the occasion. The ceremony was chaired by the Rector Ms. Fatema Begum. The presence of the electronic and print media of Bangladesh made the event lively. The ceremony was concluded with light refreshment.

In the closing ceremony, Ms. Amy Chang Lee, Regional Director, OPDAT was present as chief guest and awarded certificates to the participants. Mr. Terry Kinney, Legal Advisor, OPDAT was also present as special guest. Rector, Ms. Fatema Begum presided over the ceremony. The members of ICITAP and OPDAT's Bangladesh office as well as the Directing Staff of PSC were present in that occasion. The ceremony ended with light refreshment.

Visit of ATA Assessment Team to conduct assessment for ATA training programs in Bangladesh



US Department of Justice ATA training assessment team visited PSC on 5 January, 2015

On 5 January 2015, PSC received an important visit from the US Department of State Antiterrorism Assistance (ATA) program. The team consisted of two members representing the official six-member team. They took visit to PSC as a part of their official visit along with Dhaka's Bomb Disposal Unit (BDU) and SWAT Team of Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP). Its main aim was to conduct assessment of ATA programs. This assessment will help to determine the effectiveness of assistance provided and to plan for the delivery of future assistance to arrange a mentorship program for these two units of DMP.

On 5 January 2015, PSC received an important visit from the US Department of State Antiterrorism Assistance (ATA) program. The team consisted of two members representing the official six-member team. They took visit to PSC as a part of their official visit along with Dhaka's Bomb Disposal Unit (BDU) and SWAT Team of Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP). Its main aim was to conduct assessment of ATA programs. This assessment will help to determine the effectiveness of assistance provided and to plan for the delivery of future assistance to arrange a mentorship program for these two units of DMP.

The Assessing team met Rector and other senior faculties of PSC at the Rector's Conference Room. The team was entertained with light refreshment. The discussion aspired for the success of the team's assessment which is needed for designing the future training programs.

Core Courses:

Due to unavoidable circumstances emerged from the political unrest in the early 2015, PSC could not run its core courses in this tenure. As PSC's core courses are based on the participants from ASP to upwards, PSC immediately felt a crisis of the trainees. Partnership Courses

In this Jan-April tenure PSC conducted a number of courses with national and international development partners. Like the regular fashion, in this term the following organizations were engaged with PSC in

conducting courses. These are: Anti-Terrorism Assistance Program (ATA) from US Department of State, International Criminal Investigative Training Assistance Program (ICITAP) from US Department of Justice, Police Reform Programme (PRP), Criminal Investigation Department (CID) and Dharitri Bangladesh. In this period, PSC went for joint courses of, five (5) with ATA, one (1) each with ICITAP, PRP, CID and Dharitri Bangladesh.

Partnership with ATA

In the Jan-Apr term, ATA conducted five (5) courses at PSC. These are Advanced Travel Document Examination Course (ATDE) in two batches, Border Control Management although in 2 batches but this tenure covered only one batch, Interdicting Terrorist Activities (ITA) and Interviewing Terrorist Suspects (ITS) in one batch each. The participants were mainly from Bangladesh Police and Bangladesh Border Guard. But officer from Department of Immigration and Passport (DIP) also attended the course. In this time, they provided training to a total of 115 government officials. ATA conducted courses were taught in English facilitated by the ATA instructors. However, the trainings were provided with simultaneous interpretation in Bangla. Usually two simultaneous interpreters were present with interpreting equipment to support the courses and activities. ATA courses usually provide study materials written in English along with Compact Disc (CD).

Course on 'Advanced Travel Document Examination Course (ATDE)'



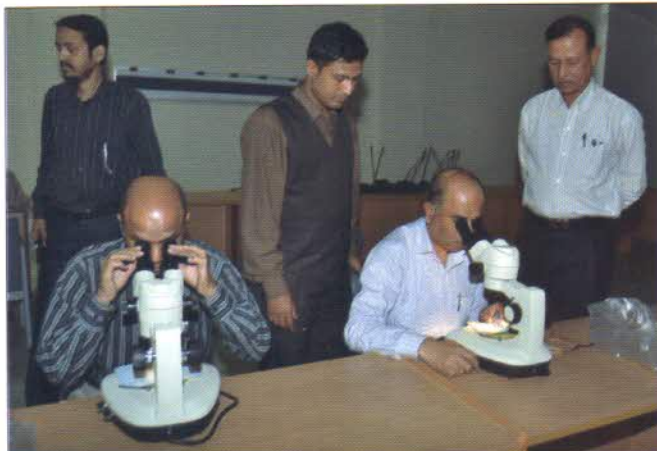

ATA conducted ATDE course in two batches. First batch was held between 02-05 March, 2015 and the second batch was between 08-11 March, 2015. The participants were from Bangladesh police and Border Guard (BGB) Bangladesh in the rank of Sub-Inspector to Additional SP. A total of 47 participants were awarded certificates in recognition of their successful completion of the course.

Advanced Travel Document Examine (ATDE) course

Course description and objectives:

Advanced Travel Document Examine (ATDE) course is a four-day course designed for average 24 participants who are experienced in document examination and who examine travel documents on a routine basis. The course began with a review of basic characteristics of security features found in genuine travel documents, and how these features can be replicated and simulated in counterfeit and altered documents. The participants learned and practised how to analyze a

questioned document by using various tools including lighting and magnification. Participants also practised using a stereoscopic microscope to definitively determine whether or not a questioned document is genuine, altered, or counterfeit. The course was designed with the case studies and current events related to trends in terrorism with regard to the use of fraudulent travel documents. The information on emerging technologies and the use of the e-passport were also discussed. The other discussions included the benefits of information analysis and data storage, the creation of travel document alert bulletins and the value of domestic and international information sharing.

After successful completion of this course, the participants were able to:

1. More thoroughly examine and evaluate key document security features
2. Determine whether or not a travel document is genuine, altered or counterfeit by using advanced examination tools
3. Begin creating document intelligence data banks and
4. Understand the value of and start sharing information by means of fraudulent document alters or bulletins.

Course on 'Border Control Management'

Like the previous ATDE course, Border Control management was also conducted in two batches in two consecutive days: from 19-30 April 2015 and from 04-14 May 2015. In this term, only one batch has been accomplished. The participants were mainly from BGB in the position of Company Commander, JCO, BOP Commander, Platoon Commander etc. The other participants included: four (4) inspectors from immigration Police and one from Department of Immigration and Passport (DIP). A total of 20 participants attended the course and graduated accordingly.

Border Control Management course was a ten-day course designed to introduce the participants with the tools and techniques required to understand current border management issues. The target audience included mid-to-senior level border control managers and supervisors with onsite operational responsibility for land border ports-of-entry and the land between ports and the concerned officials engaged in the same areas.

Through a series of lectures, discussions and problem solving activities, a team consisting of border guard, police and passport officials were able to identify terrorism threats to land borders and solutions for addressing and mitigating those threats. The participants received an overview of current terrorist methods and threats including an awareness of Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear and Explosive (CBRNE) materials, equipment and methods used to build these devices. State-of-the-art surveillance, sensor and inspectional technologies used in land border operations worldwide were introduced. The discussion also included border-wide communications, public information and affairs, and integrity management system.

The participants were undergone group discussions and small group exercises to discuss human rights and the need to develop humane procedures for treating all people transiting a border,

including terrorist suspects and detainees. The course was designed in such a way as that the participants could apply strategies and tactics to fact-based, fictitious tactical problems applied to varied land border problems. The course was concluded with a tabletop exercise designed to encourage participants to consider all aspects while working a substantial problem-solving scenario. The topics included: Human rights, land border vulnerabilities, movement of people and goods, MANPAD identification and tracking, managing responses to suspected terrorists and dangerous goods, threat analysis, managing evidence for investigations, information management, integrity controls, public information, border communications and interagency and international cooperation.

At the conclusion of the course, participants were able to

1. Plan, organize and manage border operations
2. Develop plans and methods for better point of entry security
3. Develop guidelines for dissemination of intelligence
4. Coordinate efforts between agencies, and
5. Implement border monitoring equipment and techniques.

Course on Interdicting Terrorist Activities (ITA)

'Interdicting Terrorist Activities' course offered by the US Department of State Anti-Terrorism Assistance (ATA) program was held at Chameli Room, PSC during March 29-April 09, 2015. It

is a course designed for 24 participants in the rank of Sub-Inspector to Addl. SP. In this course, Mr. Tawfique Mahbub Chowdhury, Special Superintendent of Police (Administration), Special Branch, Dhaka delivered a lecture as a subject matter expert to make the US Instructors acquainted with the in-country travel document examination process during immigration.

The course is a very pro-active approach based two-week program designed for the varying levels of police officers so that they would benefit from the skills taught in the ITO program.

The course offered to those officers who worked in counterterrorism field so that they could benefit from a broad overview of the various components involved in terrorist organizations. It also aimed to train experienced investigators in the latest techniques in interdicting terrorist cells. It covered the topics like: interviewing techniques, surveillance skills, terrorist financing, media relations, preventing acts of terrorism, trends in terrorism, cyber terrorism and human rights. The course was very practical and exercise based considering the training aspects of Bangladesh.

Course on Interviewing Terrorist Suspects (ITS)

Interviewing Terrorist Suspects course was conducted at PSC on April 12-16, 2015. The course is a 5-day long course developed for the instructors of training institutes, counter-terrorism investigators, and mid-level supervisors who conduct interviews and interrogations of terrorist

suspects. Total 24 participants in the rank of Sub-Inspector to Additional SP attended the course. Beside the members of Bangladesh Police, the members of Border Guard Bangladesh in the rank from Subedar to Wing Commander also participated in this training program.

This one-week course is designed to introduce the participants with the need to develop skills for effectively interviewing terrorist suspects. Using instructor presentations, demonstrations, group discussions and activities, and scenario-based learning exercises, participants can explore and develop skills that allow them to conduct non-coercive interviews that are consistent with international human rights standards and meet accepted standards for admissibility in most courts of law within the partner nation. Through this course, the participants effectively developed listening and observation skills that allow them to maximize the information gathered through an interview with a terrorist suspect and minimize contamination of that information.

The course covered the following topics: human rights, interviewing for combating terrorism, effective communications skills, interviewing for results, analyzing the interview and interrogation. In addition, participants were able to identify potential challenges in implementing effective interviewing techniques at their agencies and develop strategies for overcoming any resistance encountered.

To institutionalize this training, a good number of instructors (11) were nominated for this class so that they would further assist the USATA instructors to teach and instruct the future ITS classes. The goal is to incorporate the ITS curriculum in the training curriculum of the participatory training institutes who would train their fellow participants. Accordingly, 24 instructors received this training.

Partnership with PRP:

Workshop on 'Identification of priorities of Police Reform Programme.

In this term, PRP arranged only one training program at PSC. The program, 'Identification of Priorities of Police Reform Program' was a day long workshop conducted on 24-03-2015. Honourable IGP Mr. AKM Shahidul Hoque, bpm, ppm and Mr. Md. Mokhlesur Rahman bpm (bar) graced the occasion as Chief Guest and Special Guest respectively. The workshop was presided over by the Rector, PSC Ms. Fatema Begum. A number of higher ranking police officers and the officials from PRP were present in and contributed

to that workshop. Mr. Wojciech Coprowicz, ICT Systems and Strategy Specialist, PRP was the keynote speaker of this workshop. The keynote presentation was followed by group exercises and presentations. Around 30 participants from different units of Bangladesh Police as well as PRP members participated in that workshop. The workshop came up with several points, which need to be considered by PRP in their next strategic steps. The workshop ended with light refreshment.

Development on e-learning process in the Training System: A2i will provide e-learning software to PSC

In line with Government of Bangladesh vision 2020, PSC takes initiatives for adopting e-learning process in its future training strategy. Some ground works have been undertaken since 2014 under the initiatives of PSC's Curriculum Section. In such persuasion, Curriculum Section maintains a close relation with Access to Information program (A2i). Several meeting were held between these two offices.

A significant success is made in the development of e-learning process in PSC. A2i makes a commitment to provide e-learning software to PSC. In this process, necessary ground works are going on, server feasibility, for example. Moreover, a regular workshop is held on PSC's core courses such as Police Management Course (PMC) and Police Financial Management Course (PFMC). A session on e-tendering along with CPTU activities is conducted in PFMC on a regular basis.

The e-learning process has several benefits if properly implemented. These are as follows:

- Greater accessibility to learning by offering anytime and anywhere delivery
- It is self paced. It means it allow the learners to revisit the same program at their own pace to refresh and retest their knowledge.
- It is readily scalable since it can accommodate larger volumes of learners at little extra cost. Classrooms limitations do not apply here and it can save a significant amount of travel cost per year.
- Timely updated: The materials that are delivered online are centrally developed and updated whenever the need arises. So the costs of replacing outdated course materials and retraining teachers and instructors drop significantly. At the same time, frequent updates become much more manageable.

However, in doing so PSC has to overcome some following obstacles:

- Lack of access to technology among some learner populations.
- Sometimes students become frustrated by course materials or technology and thus less engaged because of the relative absence of instructor-learner and learner-learner interaction.
- It needs compatible technology. Students and teachers both may lack the technical skills they need to succeed.
- If not properly managed, the success rate would be minimal.
- High installation cost
- Lack of credibility: It is still perceived that distant learning has poorer quality than that of traditional face to face and classroom-based training.

In the Jan-April tenure, a e-learning software is provided by the A2i. A2i is giving the consultancy program to make familiar the PSC faculties with this system.

RP & E Wing Organized a Workshop on Research methodology for the Police Officers and Young Social Researchers

PSC's RP&E wing has developed a training program on 'Research Methodology' for the police officers of Bangladesh Police and the young social researchers. The workshop was held on 12 January, 2015. Around 56 participants who were interested in research participated in that workshop. Mr. Md. Matiur Rahman Sheikh, MDS (RP&E) was the Course Advisor and Professor Rezaul Karim, PhD, Chairman Department of Social Work, Jagannath University, Dhaka was the Course Director of the workshop. Mr. Md. Shahjahan ppm Director (Research & Publication) conducted the workshop as course coordinator.

In conducting research, PSC's RP&E Wing faces crucial challenges in creating, nurturing and maintaining the level of quality research in social science areas. Hence, there is a need to develop

a sound methodological base of research among growing researchers to cope up with future challenges. A good research methodology is the key to sound research output. To operationalize this vision, there is a need to train, reorient and reactivate the research scholars in social science on research methodology.

The present workshop is an effort to enrich the research scholars in social science research methodology. It covered the basics of research methodology focusing on theoretical and practical inputs; specifically the formulation of research problem, generating research hypothesis and testing hypothesis, conducting literature review, data collection methods, selection of appropriate parametric or non-parametric statistical method for analyzing data and report writing.

The objectives of this workshop are:

1. To enable the participants to define research problem, developing an approach to research problem and selection of suitable design
2. To impart capabilities for formulation and testing of hypothesis based on the nature of research
3. To enable the participants to understand report writing and writing research proposals
4. To make aware the participants about latest trends in social science research discipline.

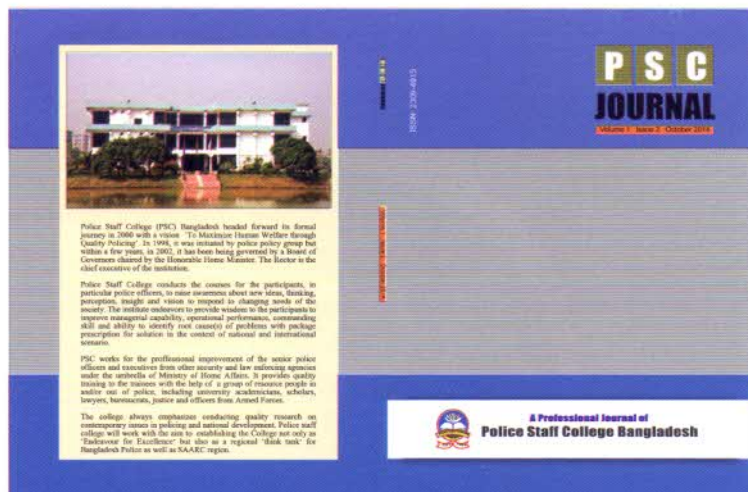


Progress of vertical extension of PSC academic building

Important upcoming dates:

Border Control Management Course (2nd Batch), an ATA sponsored course will be held from 3-14 May, 2014. The course is designed for 24 participants in the rank of Sub-Inspector to Addl SP. Officers from Border Guard Bangladesh, Passport and Immigrations also can participate in this course. Although an initial vetting from the US Embassy is necessary to be a participant of this course.

Investigating Terrorist Incident course will be held on 24 May- 04 June 2015. Sponsoring agency is ATA. Like the previous one, this course is designed for 24 participants in the rank of Sub-Inspector to Addl SP. Officers who are working in counterterrorism units are suitable for this course. Although an initial vetting from the US Embassy is needed to be a participant of this course.

Orientation course for the newly promoted superintendent of police will be held on 23-28 May 2015. It is a PSC organized course designed for the police executives who are recently promoted to the rank of SP. Main aim of this course is to develop their leadership skill and to reinforce their acquired skill and knowledge so that they can be more confident in leading their respective units very diligently and efficiently.

EIC mentorship course will be held from 24 May-11 June 2015. The sponsoring agency is ATA. This course is designed for 24 participants in the rank of Sub-Inspector to Inspector, but vetting from the US Embassy is required to attend this course.
